Recognition Award

This award is handed out each year at the Men's Region 1 Championships. Scott Barclay



Scott Barclay has been coaching gymnastics since 1979 and is the head coach of the Arizona State University Men's Gymnastics Club Team. A 13-time National Coach of the Year and ASU Hall of Fame inductee, he has led the ASU Club team to 18 Collegiate National Titles, producing 8 Individual Event National Champions and 78 All-Americans—all while operating a self-funded program with no financial support from the university.

Originally from Oak Park, IL, Scott began as a swimmer and diver before discovering gymnastics in high school. Competing under coach Clarke Shultes, he earned a state podium finish in the all-around alongside future Olympian Bart Conner. At ASU, Scott became an All-American, helped the Sun Devils to a second-place NCAA finish in 1978, and continued competing as a USA National Team member from 1977–1979. Representing the U.S. internationally, he competed in the Hapoel Games in Israel, the Spartakiad Games in Moscow, and a national tour of Australia. He was the AAU National All-Around Champion in 1980.

After ASU won the NCAA Team Title in 1986, Scott became a full-time assistant coach until the varsity program was discontinued in 1993. Committed to keeping gymnastics alive at ASU, he transitioned the team to a club program, where he has continued to coach and develop top collegiate athletes.

Scott also served as an FIG Brevet judge for two decades, officiating national championships, the Pacific Rim Championships, and the American Cup. Today, he remains dedicated to growing the sport through GymACT, expanding collegiate opportunities for young men across the country. His passion for gymnastics, mentorship, and athlete development continues to shape the future of the sport.
